Georgia National Fair

Each year, in conjunction with the Georgia National Fair in Perry, Animal and Dairy Science along with Georgia 4-H and FFA host the state market lamb and market goat shows. Our numbers continue to grow and as hundreds of students take part in the most popular youth livestock activity available in our state. Over 500 youth from all over our great state showed off their hard work by exhibiting over 800 head of sheep and goats. While only a few champions were selected that weekend, the number of lessons learned and memories made that weekend are immeasurable.

The Southeastern 3 Livestock Judging Contest

Along with the University of Florida, we host a regional livestock judging competition each year in Perry around the first weekend of December. I am amazed each year as the number of participants continue to grow and new states are represented. This year over 400 students traveled from seven states to participate in what we call the SE3. Teams traveled from as far as Arkansas and Virginia (and everywhere in between) to evaluate 19 classes of high-quality livestock assembled from our very generous friends and producers in Georgia and Florida.

Georgia Junior National Livestock Shows

The Georgia youth livestock community spent February 21st – 24th in Perry at the Georgia National Fairgrounds for the 2024 Georgia Junior National Livestock Show. A years' worth of early mornings and late nights all came down to one last trip to Perry, Georgia. Countless hours, hard-work, and sweat equity went into preparing these livestock projects for the last show of the season. Over four days 1,825 exhibitors brought over 2,750 beef cattle, dairy cattle, ewes, does, and hogs to Perry, GA.

Top Hand Stockmanship and Stewardship Contest

The Top Hand Stockmanship and Stewardship contest is an impactful youth cattle handling and Beef Quality Assurance education program that offers hand-on, team competitions. In this contest, teams of 3 students compete by processing three head of cattle while following a protocol prescribed by contest administration in administering multiple pharmaceuticals and forms of identification. As a result of this program, students receive training and hands-on experience in working as a team to handle and administer vaccines, apply appropriate identification, keep important records, and follow Beef Quality Assurance Guidelines. In 2024 an additional regional contest was started in Summerville, which added to the contest already hosted in Carrollton, Tifton, and Athens. The top teams from each regional contest were invited to compete in the state contest hosted by Andy Dunn at the Alapaha Beef Unit in Berrien County. Similar to past years, this contest was extremely close and competitive. Actually, there was a tie for first place between the "Crisp County Girls" and the "Chattooga County Senior Citizens". The tie was broken on a tough Stockman's quiz that required students to identify equipment, feeds, breeds, and answer several animal health questions. After the dust settled, the team called "Chattooga County Senior Citizens" was named the 2024 Top Hands.
